

Six Nations Championship

This annual tournament was first held as **Home Nations Championship** featuring ENG, IRL, SCO and WAL in 1882/83. Including FRA it became the **Five Nations Championship** in 1910. Excluding FRA in 1932 - 1939 the competition was named again Home Nations Championship in that time.

The Five Nations Championship expanded to the **Six Nations Championship** by inclusion of ITA since 2000 onwards.

Organized by the Six Nations Committee the competition has been accepted meanwhile as the official European Championship by IRB and FIRA-AER.

The format of the competition was never changed: Each team plays every other team once with home soil advantage changing from year to year. Since 1995, teams equal on match points do not longer share the ranking, but ties have been broken by considering the points difference.

¹ not completed; The 1885 Championship was notable for the disputes occurring between the Home Nation Unions which prevented a full tournament to be completed. ENG and SCO refused to face each other due to the refereeing disagreement from their 1884 encounter, and WAL and IRL also failed to meet due to union disputes. The 1885 Championship also experienced a rare replay, when the IRL vs. SCO game at Ormeau was abandoned after bad weather stopped play. The replay was played in Scotland.

² The game IRL vs. WAL was not played.

³ ENG was excluded from the Championship due to their refusal to join the IRFB.

⁴ ENG was excluded from the Championship due to their refusal to join the IRFB.

⁵ not completed; WAL only completed one match during this championship as the Welsh Rugby Union withdrew from the International Rugby Football Board in February 1897 due to the Gould Affair (The Welsh team captain Arthur Gould should get financial compensation which the IRFB had seen as illegal professionalism. Only the resignation of Gould resolved this problem.) and was therefore ineligible to play any further international matches.

⁶ For the second year running, ENG claimed the title solely on the fact that the other Home Nation Unions were still in bitter dispute. The Scottish Rugby Union was still aggrieved at the situation caused by the Gould Affair and decided not to participate in a match against Wales. This decision meant ENG led the scoring table as the winner of a SCO vs. WAL encounter would have taken the Championship.

Due to the dispute, most source list the result of the 1898 championship as "not completed."

⁷ Shortly after the 1931 tournament, FRA was expelled from the competition amid allegations of professionalism in the domestic game (rugby union was officially an amateur sport until 1995) and perceived administrative deficiencies. FRA remained expelled through the 1939 competition. They were readmitted later in 1939, but the outbreak of World War II in Europe halted international rugby until 1947.

⁸ The championship was not completed for the first time since World War II. SCO and WAL did not want to travel to Dublin to play IRL because of the escalating political situation. Although the remaining fixtures of the schedule were fulfilled, as both IRL and WAL won all their matches, neither could claim the title. To fill the gap of the missing two fixtures, FRA played a friendly match in Dublin (in addition to the scheduled match in Paris).

⁹ The tournament was marred by an outbreak of the highly infectious livestock disease foot and mouth disease in Britain. As a consequence, there were severe restrictions on travel especially between Britain and Ireland and thus it was decided to postpone Ireland's three fixtures against the home nations until the outbreak was contained.

¹⁰ The last match was played on Mar 08 before the competition was suspended due to the COVID-19 pandemic until Oct 24 when the missing match of the 4th round was played.

Women's Six Nations Championship

The competition began as **Home Nations Championship** for the four home nations in 1996. In 1999 FRA joined the competition to create the **Five Nations Championship**. ESP replaced IRL in 2000. IRL came back in 2002 expanding the competition to the **Six Nations Championship**. ESP was replaced by ITA in 2007 as the Six Nations committee formally adopts the Women's Six Nation.

The format of the competition is identically to the men's competition: Each team plays every other team once with home soil advantage changing from year to year. Since 2007, teams equal on match points do not longer share the ranking, but ties have been broken by considering the points difference.

European Rugby Champions Cup

Initiated by the Five Nations Committee this "Champions League of Rugby clubs" was established in 1995/96. The competition sponsored originally by a brewery was under the management of the IRB-controlled **European Rugby Cup Ltd. (ERC)**. Due to the stricter alcohol advertising law in France the Heineken Cup was known there as the H Cup.

In spring 2014 a new system of cross-border competitions in European professional rugby was agreed. Succeeding the Heineken Cup, the European Rugby Champions Cup was introduced. All the new club competitions are organized by the **European Professional Club Rugby (EPCR)** (new association following the former ERC Ltd.).

Participants are the top teams of Europe's top leagues: English Premiership 6 teams, French Top14 6 teams and Pro12 7 teams (at least one team from each participating country IRL, ITA, SCO and WAL) plus one qualifier from a playoff between next ranked teams of these three leagues.

European Rugby Challenge Cup

In 1996/97 the **European Rugby Cup Ltd. (ERC)** established the second tier **European Shield** competition for those teams of the three European top leagues do not qualify for the Heineken Cup and sometimes participants from countries like ITA, ROU, POR and ESP. It was renamed to **European Challenge Cup** in 2002/03.

The second-tier competition in the new system is the European Rugby Challenge Cup succeeding the European Challenge Cup in 2014/15. Participants are the remaining 18 teams of the three Europe's top leagues plus two qualifiers from the qualifying competition organized together with Rugby Europe.
